





Priority Document Exchange

The United States Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO) can now exchange priority documents with the Japan Patent Office (JPO) and the European Patent Office (EPO) through secure, electronic connections using the Trilateral Document Access (TDA) Web Services at no cost to the applicant. On July 28, 2007, the USPTO began exchanging priority documents electronically with the JPO, and has been exchanging priority documents with the EPO since the launch of the PDX program on January 16, 2007. PDX offers applicants a faster, economical, and more secure transmission means for priority documents.

How It Works:

Retrieving Priority Documents from EPO or JPO for USPTO Applications

- ➤ The USPTO will automatically request retrieval of Priority Documents if a U.S. application claims priority in the Oath, Declaration, or Application Data Sheet of a newly filed U.S. application.
 - o Form PTO/SB/38 or other equivalent written instruction is required for retrieval of an EPO Priority Document for placement in a U.S. application filed prior to June 4, 2007.
 - Form PTO/SB/38 or other equivalent written instruction is required for retrieval of a JPO Priority Document for placement in a U.S. application filed prior to July 28, 2007.

Transmitting U.S. Priority Documents to the EPO or JPO

- > The USPTO will electronically transmit a Priority Document to the EPO or JPO only if a request to do so is received from one of those Offices <u>and</u> if at least one of the following criteria is met:
 - o The U.S. application is published or patented;
 - The applicant submitted written authorization (e.g., Form PTO/SB/39) to transmit the Priority Document to the EPO/JPO, and the U.S. application has cleared national security review.
